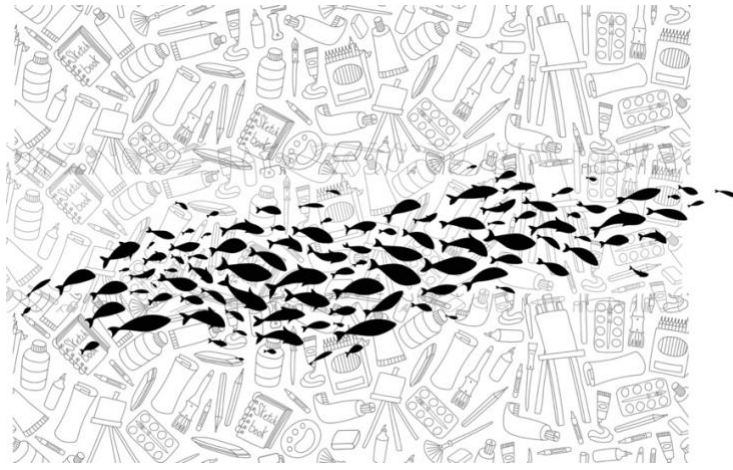




THE TWILIGHT OF THE ART SCHOOL : *from Personal Voice to Collaboration*
